What is FrogWatch USA™?

It is a long-term frog and toad monitoring citizen science program managed by the American Zoo Association (AZA) with over ten years of data that helps scientists study amphibian population trends. It is also an exciting hands-on tool for learning about amphibians and wetland conservation

Frogs and toads are important – and in trouble!

Frogs and toads are both predators and prey in aquatic and terrestrial food webs. They directly benefit humans by eating insects that can be pests and transmit diseases. They are also sensitive to environmental pressures and are indicators of problems that can affect human health. Unfortunately, many populations are experiencing dramatic population declines throughout the world. It is essential that we understand the scope, scale, and cause of these declines.
